- Coached 3 undefeated football teams (his 1967 team was ranked #1 in NYS)

- Wrestling teams won three sectional titles
- Coached two NYS Champions, 9 NYS Place Finishers & 41 Sectional Champions

.....
Nott Terrace High School 1954

- All-star football player in high school & college
- Capital District All-Star Team (guard) 1952
- All-County Scholastic Football Team (guard) 1952 & 1953
- Co-captain of the 1953 undefeated Nott Terrace football team (outscored opponents 277-6)
- All-County Scholastic Football Team—1953
- Thom McCann Award—Outstanding scholastic football player
- Junior Chamber of Commerce Outstanding County Football Player
- *Scholastic Coach Magazine* High School All-American Team
- National High School Football All-America Prep All-Star Team
- Graduate of Cornell University 1958
- Guard, center & linebacker on the 1957 Cornell football team
- Selected to weekly ECAC All-Star team 3 times in 1957 (vs. Colgate, Harvard & Brown)
- Selected to All Ivy League second team as guard in 1957
- All Ivy League honorable mention as a center 1957 (changed positions during season)
- Honorable Mention ECAC All Major College Team
- Cornell Alumni Most Improved Player Award
- Received Cornell University Athletic Association Award for outstanding contribution to Cornell Athletics
- Participated in AAU Boxing Championship (NCAA & Ivy league rules prevented him from advancing)
- Cornell University Boxing Champion, Light Heavyweight Champion (Fr. & Soph.), Heavyweight Champion (Sr.)

Joe DeMeo

.....
Mont Pleasant High School 1960

- Declined opportunities to enter professional boxing & try out for the Buffalo Bills
- Teacher at Linton High School (1958—59)
- Coached freshman football at Linton (1958)
- Played football & wrestled at Mont Pleasant High School
- Undefeated in wrestling dual meets during his three-year varsity career
- Won the Section II Tournament in 1960 (pinned all 4 opponents in record time—6:48)
- Voted Best Wrestler in Section II (1960)
- Received the Mastroianni Award
- Varsity wrestler for three years at Cornell University
- Had two undefeated dual meet wrestling seasons (lost one dual meet in three years)
- Undefeated vs. Ivy League opponents
- Cornell won the Ivy League Wrestling Championship all 3 years
- Won the National Freestyle Championship after college
- Assistant wrestling coach at Michigan State (3 yrs.)
- Assistant wrestling coach at Stanford for one year
- Head wrestling coach at Stanford for 6 years (winningest coach at the time, in school history)
- Coached several All-Americans
- Assistant Wrestling Coach at SUNY Albany for 1 Year
- Varsity Wrestling Coach at SUNY Albany (17 years) - Coached 47 All-Americans and 5 NCAA Champions
- Head coach of the U.S. Greco Roman World Team (4 times)
- National Coach of the year for U.S.A. Wrestling (3 times)
- Coached in the Pan American Games (head coach twice, assistant coach 5 times)
- Helped to coach numerous U.S. Jr. World Teams
- Member of the National Wrestling Coaching Staff for 30 years
- Coached in World Championships (17 times)
- Head coach of the World Cup team (5 times)
- Member of the U.S. Olympic Coaching Staff ('76, '80, '88, '92)

- Coached two Olympic Gold Medalists
- Coached over 75 times in international competition
- One of the founders of the Adirondack Three-Style Wrestling Association (ATWA)
- Member of the Mont Pleasant H.S. Athletic Hall of Fame
- Member of the NYS Wrestling Hall of Fame
- Member of the NCAA Wrestling Hall of Fame
- Member of the Capital District Sports Hall of Fame

Marty Servo*

.....
Nott Terrace High School

- Born in Schenectady on November 3, 1919 (real name was Mario Severino)
- Ran cross-country at Nott Terrace High School
- Began boxing in the mid-1930's
- Compiled an amateur record of 91-4—Won the Golden Gloves & Diamond Belt Featherweight Titles
- Turned professional in 1938
- Initially fought as a lightweight
- 43-0-2 record in his first three years as a pro
- As a welterweight, he lost to the legendary Sugar Ray Robinson in two close decisions
- Professional career was interrupted by World War II (he served in the Coast Guard)
- Resumed boxing after World War II
- Won the Welterweight Title by knocking out Freddie "Red" Cochrane in the fourth round on February 1, 1946
- Lost to middleweight Rocky Graziano, in a non-title fight on March 29, 1946
- Retired from boxing on September 25, 1946
- Pro boxing record 48-4-2
- Inducted into the International Boxing Hall of Fame in 1989 (Denver, CO)
- Inducted into the World Boxing Hall of Fame in 2003 (Commerce, CA)
- Inducted into the Capital District Sports Hall of Fame in 2003
- Died in 1969

*Will be inducted posthumously
