Civil Rights Complaint

Schenectady Superintendent Larry Spring filed a Civil Rights Complaint with the United States Department of Justice in July 2014. The complaint argues that the funding structure implemented by New York State has resulted in de facto discrimination.


Data shows that New York State distributes school aid in a way that gives school districts with more non-white students a lower percentage of school aid than what is prescribed by law and especially when compared to school districts with a majority of white students. Different treatment of students based on race is a violation of Federal law.

Justice Civil Rights Division, Educational Opportunities Section fully investigate the claim,

The complaint requests that the Department of property taxes. correct the violations of law and order appropriate

Facts

- School Districts with higher concentrations of non-white students are systemically underfunded. The whiter a school district's student population, the more likely it is to receive full or close to full funding. New York State's current methods for distributing education aid have a discriminatory impact on non-white students.
- Districts that are predominantly non-white comprise 32.4 percent of all the districts funded at a low rate of 50-59 percent. Eighty percent of majority non-white districts are receiving less than the median level of funding.



Since 2009, the Schenectady City School District has been forced to make staff and program cuts, changes in operation and use reserves to close consecutive gaps totaling nearly \$40 million. The residents of Schenectady continue to struggle with increased

- The Schenectady City School District is one of the poorest districts in New York State and receives only 55 percent of the Foundation Aid that it should be receiving by law. The children of Schenectady are shortchanged more than \$60 million annually
- Schenectady is among a short list of school districts receiving the lowest percentage of Foundation Aid in the state. The *median* level of funding across New York State is 82 percent. If Schenectady was funded at the median level, the district would receive nearly \$40 million more in aid.
