LEGACY TRIBUTES

1961 LINTON HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM

- Linton finished with a 7-1 record; only loss was to powerful Easton HS (PA)
- Class "A" League champions (outscored league opponents 85-0)
- Shut out all Section II opponents including a 27-0 victory over Diocesan League champion, LaSalle
- Defeated NY Military Academy & Newburgh
- Dick Lalla was head coach; Athletic Hall of Fame members Dom Denio & Ed Catino were ass't coaches
- Athletic Hall of Famers Ron Oyer, Paul Bricoccoli & Mike Meola were team members
- Oyer was an All-American; Bricoccoli & Rit Wilgocki were honorable mention All-Americans
- Oyer, Bricoccoli, Wilgocki, Meola & Dick Farone were First Team Gazette All-Stars; they were joined by Dan DeMeo & Lou Gregory as First Team Union Star All-Stars; Howie Lorch & Bill Makofski were second team All-County & Ted Trapini was third team
- Oyer played football at Syracuse U. (co-captain as a senior; started in SU backfields that included Jim Nance, Floyd Little & Larry Csonka); Bricoccoli started at quarterback for Rhode Island (3 years); Tom Wheeler also played at Rhode Island

NOTT TERRACE HIGH SCHOOL TENNIS (1949-1954)

Nott Terrace HS, coached by Sam Thompson, had six consecutive undefeated tennis teams from 1949-1954. These six teams won 76 consecutive matches. After three victories in 1955, the streak ended at 79 consecutive victories when NT dropped a 5-2 decision to Mont Pleasant H.S.

1949 (10-0 record): A 5-2 victory over Albany Academy was the closest margin of victory. Stewart Stearns was the primary #1 player. He was runner-up in the Sectionals. Joe Guerra & Burt Kahn also saw playing time at #1.

1950 (15-0 record-winning streak reached 25): Stewart Stearns was once again #1. He won the Section II singles title.

1951 (14-0 record-streak reached 39): Four players alternated as #1 player (Jack Boyajian, Joe Guerra, Lou Gwiner & Howie Hubbard). NT defeated an all-start team consisting of players from Glens Falls & Hudson Falls twice (9-0 and 8-1). Guerra was Section II runner up. Gwinner & Hubbard won the Sectional doubles title.

1952 (13-0 record-winning streak extended to 52): Justus Kusserow & Stan Majerowksi were the top two players & reached the Section II final (won by Kusserow).

1953 (13-0 record – streak reached 65): Majerowski was the primary #1 singles player. Floyd Downs & Myles Bader also saw some time at #1. All three players reached the Sectional singles final four. Majerowski won the Section II singles title.

1954 (11-0 record-streak extended to 76): Floyd Downs was the primary #1 singles player. He won the Sectional title, defeating teammate Tom Poole in the final.

JACK EDWARDS

- All-County football player at Mont Pleasant HS as a junior & senior
- An end who scored 5 touchdowns for MP's 6-1-1 football team in 1959 (tied Utica Free Academy & lost to White Plains.
- 1959 Scholastic Magazine Football All-American
- Thom McAn Award winner
- Played in the 1960 Prep All-American Football Classic in Hershey, PA (attendance – 23,500); he caught 4 passes for 48 yards in the game (only 4 completions)
- Section II Class "A" champion in the 180-yard low hurdles (3 years); Sectional champion in the 120-yard high hurdles (2 years)
- Set the Section II Meet 180-yard low hurdles record; also set meet records at the Utica Invitational & Rye Invitational
- Set the Schenectady Interscholastic Sports Carnival Meet record in the 180-yard low hurdles (19.4)
- 1960 Mont Pleasant AC Athlete of the Year (shared award with Linton's Barry Kramer)
- Lettered in football at Boston U. in 1961
- Current mayor of Pineville, NC

ERNIE MARSHALL

- Outstanding sprinter at Mont Pleasant HS in the 1930s; team captain; coached by Athletic Hall of Famer Norm Kitching
- Ran on two winning teams at the Penn Relays Championships of America (1936 Interscholastic Medley Championship & 1937 Two-Mile Championship); ran anchor on 1937 team
- Won the 100, 220 & 440 in two consecutive New Hampshire Interscholastic Track & Field Championship Meets; set records in the 220-yards (21.4) & 440-yards (49.2)
- Finished second in the high & prep school 440-yard championship at Madison Square Garden in 1937
- Won the 220-yard dash at the 1937 Class "A" Eastern New York Public School Athletic League Championship
- Won the 60 & 400 yard dashes at the Dartmouth Indoor Interscholastic Meet (Feb. 1937)
- A New York Herald Tribune sports columnist compared him to Olympic champion Jesse Owens: "Another Jesse Owens in the Making"
- Named to the Dan Ferris' 1938 National All-Scholastic track team (best 220-yard runner in scholastic circles)
- His 220-yard Sectional record (21.6) stood for 19 years
- His 440-yard Sectional record (49.2) stood for 23 years
- National Junior AAU 440-yard champion
- Considered to be a candidate for the 1940 U.S. Olympic team (Olympics were not held due to WWII)

CASPER WELLS



- Standout baseball player at Schenectady HS
- Played on three consecutive Big Ten championship teams from 2000-2002; his 2000 team was undefeated in the league
- Selected as Big Ten League All-Star in 2001 & 2002; named the 2002 Player of the Year by Troy Record
- All-State selection 2002
- Outstanding pitcher (11-1; 0.38 ERA) on the 2002 Schenectady HS team that won the Sectionals, Regional & reached the State final (winning pitcher in five post-season games in 2002, including the State semi-final game)
- Had a highly successful collegiate career at Towson University; 6-0 pitching record as a junior, striking out 53 in 70 innings & batted .362 with 18 home runs & 66 RBI; batted .351 with 28 home runs & 115 RBI in his college career
- Colonial Athletic Association Outstanding Player of the Year in 2005; All-CAA selection in 2004 & 2005
- Drafted by the Detroit Tigers in 2005 in the 14th round
- Played for five Major League Teams (Tigers, Mariners, A's, White Sox & Phillies)
- Went 4-for-4 in a game as a rookie (Tigers vs. Rangers)
- Had a four-game home run streak while with the Mariners in 2011
- Hit a 2 run home run off Andy Pettitte on Mother's Day (with his mother in attendance)
- Possessed a strong arm from the outfield; had 21 career assists
- Batted .230, with 25 home runs & 81 RBI in his MLB career (276 games); he also pitched in 2 MLB games
- Capital District/NYS Baseball HOF inductee
