Peter Famiano

Linton High School, Class of 1962

- Won the Times Union Hearst golf championship for juniors in 1960

- Member of the University of Houston golf team (1962–1966)
- Played on the South African PGA Tour during winter months (1971–1988)

- NJPGA Senior Player of the Year (1994, 1995 and 2002)
- NJPGA Golf Pro of the Year (1988 & 1995)

- 2001 NJPGA Merchandiser of the Year
- Won the 2002 NJPGA Senior championship
- Won the 2002 Metropolitan Senior Open (holds tournament record)
- Montclair State University golf coach (1979-1999)
- Took 5 individuals & 1 team to the NCAA Division III Golf Championship (1st team to ever represent Montclair State in the NCAA Championship)
- · Coached four All-Americans
- Montclair State Golf Director (2000-2003)
- NJPGA President (1994—1996)
- Played in 2 U.S. Senior Opens and 2 Senior PGA Championships
- Voted by peers and rated by Golf Digest: second best teacher in NJ (2000)
- Head golf pro at Crestmont CC (1973-2004)
- Shares Crestmont CC course record, 65, with Cary Middlecoff
- Became golf director at Crestmont CC in 2005
- . Inducted into the N.J. PGA Hall of Fame in 2004
- Northern NJ Chapter National Multiple Sclerosis Society "Supporter of the Decade" (1986)
- Instrumental in starting the NJ State Golf Association "Hook a Kid on Golf" Caddie Scholarship program

- Active in the Metropolitan Golf Assoc. Foundation's "Golfworks" program, which offers employment to financially disadvantaged & minority children
- Nominated for the Metropolitan Golf Association's Distinguished Service Award (2007)
- · Has played, coached, administered & promoted golf

Joe Loudis

Mont Pleasant High School, Class of 1960

- Member of the 1953 Sch'dy Little League All-Star team (runner-up in the Little League World Series)
- Member of the 1954 Sch'dy Little League World Championship team (lead off hitter; played 2nd base)
- · Played against Boog Powell & Ken Hubbs in LLWS
- City of Sch'dy Junior Tennis champion (1954-1957)
- Ran a 4:27 mile while a student at Central Park Junior High School (1956)
- Avg. 35 ppg, leading 1956–57 Sch'dy Jewish Community Center 9th grade basketball team to a perfect 35-0 season (Barry Kramer was a teammate)
- Scored a record 80 points in a Jewish CC intramural basketball game during the 1956-57 season
- Lettered in baseball, basketball, cross-country and tennis at Mont Pleasant
- Played in the Sch'dy Twilight Baseball League
- Played #1 on Mont Pleasant's undefeated tennis team in 1958
- Second baseman, shortstop and pitcher on Mont Pleasant's undefeated baseball team in 1960
- Attended Marshall University on basketball scholarship
- Transferred to Albany State and played basketball for "Doc" Sauers (1962-1964)
- Played in the Country Inn & Sportsman's Park fast pitch softball leagues
- Taught business at Cohoes High School for 35 years
- Coached varsity baseball at Cohoes HS (1966-1971)
- Coached varsity basketball at Cohoes HS (1967-1988)
- His Cohoes basketball teams won 7 Colonial Council championships & a Class B Sectional championship
- Overall basketball record at Cohoes was 293-145
- While at Cohoes he was selected "Coach of the Year" four times by the Troy Record
- Selected as "Coach of the Year" by WRGB in 1974
- Coached varsity basketball at Mechanicville High School (1993—1996 & 2001—present)
- His Mechanicville teams won 3 Class "CC" Sec. II titles, 3 Class "C-CC" playoffs & 3 Class C Regional titles
- Reached the semi-finals of the NYSPHSAA Basketball Tournament in 1995
- Saratogian "Coach of the Year" in 1995

- His Mechanicville team finished second in the 1996 NYSPHSAA Basketball Tournament
- His team gave up just 29 points per game in Sectional and Regional games in 1996

John Grabowski *

Schenectady High School, Class of 1918

- Started his professional baseball career with Minneapolis of the American Association in 1920.
- Played Major League Baseball with the Chicago White Sox for 3 seasons (1924-1926)
- Played with the N.Y. Yankees from 1927—1929
- Opening day catcher for the Yankees in 1927
- He had 4 hits in a 12-11, eleven inning victory over the White Sox on June 8, 1927
- The 1927 Yankees finished with a 110-44 record, winning the American League by 19 games & sweeping the Pirates (4-0) in the World Series
- Caught and batted .277 on the 1927 Yankees
- Had a .350 on base percentage in 1927
- He started Game 3 of the 1927 World Series, catching 7 perfect innings from Herb Pennock
- 1927 Yankees featured Babe Ruth & Lou Gehrig -Many consider them the greatest team in baseball history
- The 1928 Yankees finished with a 101-53 record, won the American League pennant & swept the Cardinals in 4 games in the World Series
- He was well-liked by his Murderers' Row teammates
- . He was the first Yankee to wear #8
- Also played with the Detroit Tigers in 1931
- Batted .252 in 7 Major League seasons
- · Considered to be a fine defensive catcher
- Had a fifteen year pro baseball career
- Became an umpire following pro baseball career
- Umpired in International, Canadian-American & Eastern Leagues
