Registering your child for school

Registration for school must take place in person by the parent or guardian at the Central Registration Office located in the District Central Offices at Mont Pleasant Middle School.

At this time, registration is by appointment only. Please call 518-370-8101 Ext. 28116 or 28127 to make an appointment to come in and register your child.

Office Hours

Monday - Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

To register your child, you will need the student's birth certificate, immunization record, copy of a current physical done within a year (for kindergartners only), proof of residency and picture ID for the parent/guardian.

Acceptable forms for proof of residency include current utility or phone bill, cable television bill, rental agreement, auto insurance policy, current NYS driver's license or a payroll check. (Proof must be dated within 30 days of registration.) Please contact the registration office at **370-8101 Ext. 28116** if you are having trouble obtaining acceptable forms of proof.

Health History

All new students must have a physical exam completed within 10 days of entering school. Please contact the school nurse if the exam will be done by your family doctor. A healthy history form must be completed by the parent or guardian of the child and returned to the school nurse. Please notify the school nurse of any special needs your child might have, such as allergies, medication, or physical limitations.

Required Vaccinations for Students

New York State Public Health Law mandates all students enrolled in PreK-12th grade, regardless of their learning virtually or in-person, to provide documentation that they have received all of their required vaccines. Students must be excluded from school if this documentation is not in place.

- Polio (IPV/OPV)
- **DTap, DPT, or Tdap** (Diptheria, Tetanus and Pertussis)
- MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)
- Hepatitis B
- Varicella (chickenpox)
- Meningitis

Raising Anti-Racist Children

Racism is the marginalization and/or oppression of people of color based on a socially constructed racial hierarchy that privileges white people.

Color blindness is the belief that race, and race-based differences should not be taken into account when decisions are made, impressions are formed and behaviors enacted. The logic is that color blindness can prevent prejudice and discrimination because if people do not notice race, they cannot act in a racially biased manner.

Did you know that being "color blind" is a form of racism?

Being color blind creates a society that denies racial experiences, rejects cultural heritage, and invalidates perspectives of people of color that are unique.

Color blindness tends to blame individuals for conflict and shortcomings while ignoring the larger picture, the context. Cultural differences, stereotypes, and values are important in understanding the conflicts and challenges.

The colorblind approach teaches children that race shouldn't be talked about and makes it harder for them to talk to parents about their questions. Silence about race reinforces racism.



Start Here

Do you avoid talking about race with your kids because you're afraid you'll say the wrong thing? Breaking the silence about race with kids can be challenging. With practice, you can help your child challenge stereotypes, embrace antiracist thinking and speak up for racial justice.

Model the behavior you want to see in your child. Pay attention to your behavior. Do you extend the same effort at communication and friendliness to your Black neighbors? Children are sponges and they take their cues from you.

Explore your own biases. Reflect on your own biases and how they impact your thoughts and behaviors.

Educate yourself. There are many books to read, podcasts to listen to, articles to read, movies to watch and leaders and advocates to follow on social media. We have a list of resources on our website.

Diversify your social network. Look at your social group and increase your exposure to diverse people.

Be an advocate. Actions speak louder than words. Commit to actions.

Have ongoing conversations about racism scenarios your child might encounter in real life on online. Discuss and model the different approaches to be active. Identify when it might be best to just listen, to call someone out, to amplify someone's voice to share resources.

Have discussions that are open and ongoing. These will deepen as children get older. If parents do not have the conversations with their children, the world will shape your child's thinking and ideas about race. Seek environments where your child experiences diversity.

Seek experiences to increase your child's exposure to different cultures.

Be intentional with play and learning. Do the books on your shelves and the toys your children play with lack diversity? One of the key ways to foster empathy in children is through imagination, reading and play. Diversify your bookshelf.

Point out racism and stereotypes in media. By pointing out racism and discrimination, you are helping your child develop critical thinking skills.

Diversify the media you introduce by having specific media addressing racism and race. Share stories that highlight people of color that reflect the characteristics and values your children want to have (kindness, compassion, ingenuity).

Teach your child to be an ally.

Take action. There are different ways to act including protesting, signing petitions, organizing, art activism, stepping in and stepping up when needed.

Identify real-life applications.

Share your mistakes. You will make mistakes in the process and so will your child. Reinforce that being anti-racist is a process with some missteps along the way.



Students who are socio-politically conscious and socio-culturally responsive acknowledge the limitations of their own perspectives. They have empathy for others while they appreciate and respect others' differences. They demonstrate cooperation and teamwork, using active listening and communication skills to resolve conflict. They use interpersonal skills to build and maintain strong relationships, including those along lines of difference, in their class and school communities.



Child Find Notice

Parents – if you have concerns about your child's physical, social, or academic progress, please contact your school principal to make a referral to the Committee on Special Education. If your child does not attend a district school, please contact the Director of Pupil Personnel Services at 881-3412.

Notification for Services at Private Schools

June 1 is the deadline for notifying the Schenectady City School District if you want special education services at a private school located within the district. Please contact the Quality Assurance Manager at 881-3400 ext. 26037 to request those services.

Family Education Rights and Privacy Provisions (FERPA)

Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), parents and students 18 or older may inspect official records relating to them — including progress reports, grades, aptitude and achievement test scores, psychological tests and teacher evaluations.

A record may be challenged by parents or students who are 18 or older if they believe it is inaccurate or misleading. The district will not disclose information from students' records without prior written request of a parent or eligible student, except as permitted by law. A record of requests for information disclosures is maintained and may be viewed by those eligible. Contact Student Services at 881-3412 for more information.

Special Education Referrals

If you have a pre-school child and you have noticed that your child is not developing skills such as walking, talking or playing like other school children, you may want to talk to your family doctor. If the doctor is concerned, or you remain concerned with your child's progress, you may make a referral to the school district's Committee on Pre-school Special Education (CPSE). To make this referral, call the Office of Pupil Personnel Services at 881-3413 and ask to speak with the Chairperson of the CPSE or her secretary. They will help you through the process.

If your school-age child is having difficulties in school, first talk to his or her teacher. Our schools offer supports for students within regular education who are experiencing difficulties. This is done through the School Based Support Team (SBST) in your child's building. You can contact the chairperson of this team by calling your child's school and asking to speak to the school psychologist. You can also discuss your concerns with your child's teacher and ask them to help you request assistance.

If you are concerned that your child's teacher and School Based Support Team have not adequately been able to help, your child may have a disability which affects his or her learning. To find out, you can make a referral to the Committee on Special Education. You can do this by talking with the SBST or directly contacting the Office of Pupil Personnel Services at 881-3413.

When are health exams of public school students required by law?

Education Law Article 19 and Regulations of the Commissioner of Education (8 NYCRR) require physical examinations of public school students:

- Entering the school district for the first time, and in grades pre-K or kindergarten, 2, 4, 7 and 10; and at any grade level by school administration, at their discretion, to promote the educational interests of the student
- In order to participate in strenuous physical activity, such as interscholastic athletics
- In order to obtain an employment certificate
- When conducting an individual evaluation or re-evaluation of a student suspected of having a disability or a student with a disability

COVID-19 Health and Safety Reminders

Please review the following health practices with your child:

Cover your mouth and nose with a face covering when around others:

Face coverings are required at all times including on the school bus and in classrooms. Always wear a face covering when you are around people who do not live in your household. The mask is meant to protect other people in case you are infected. Students are not allowed to remove face coverings on the bus or in school without the permission of an adult. If your child does not have a face covering or forgets to bring it, one will be provided.

Keep six feet or more between yourself and others. The mask is not a substitute for social distancing.

Following directions of signs and arrows:

Signs and arrows are placed to ensure that social distancing can occur. Always walk to the right and follow the direction of arrows on the floor or walls.

Clean Hands Often:

Wash your hands often with soap and water routinely for at least 20 seconds. Dry hands completely after washing. Use paper towels instead of a hand dryer. If soap and water are not available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.

Cover coughs and sneezes:

Always cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.

Throw used tissues in the trash.

Immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

If you have any questions or concerns, please submit them through Let's Talk on the district website.

If Your Child is Sick:

Please have arrangements in place, should your child need to unexpectedly be picked up from school. While we realize leaving and traveling from work can pose a challenge, students cannot remain in the health offices or isolation spaces for long periods of time. Please understand that you might be required to pick up your child if they are exposed to COVID-19, even if they do not have symptoms.

Please do not send your child to school if he or she has symptoms of COVID-19, which can include:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- · Loss of taste or smell
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea
- Stomach pain, vomiting, diarrhea

Per current guidelines issued by the DOH, if a student presents with any of the above symptoms, or any symptoms of any viral infection including conjunctivitis, they will need to be sent home. When a student is sent home with any of these symptoms, they should be seen by a healthcare provider.

Returning to School:

The following is required before a student can return to school after illness:

• A note from their health care provider must be provided

• A negative COVID-19 test must be provided, AND

• Your child must be symptom free for 24 hours without any fever-reducing medications.

If your child is not seen by a healthcare provider, he or she can return to school once 10 days has passed and they are feeling well.

According to NYS guidelines, even if a student is diagnosed with an alternative diagnosis (i.e. strep throat), a COVID-19 test must be obtained and be negative. These guidelines continue to be under review on a regular weekly basis and may change in the future.

What if My Child Has a Pre-existing Condition

If your child has a pre-existing condition (such as seasonal allergies, causing congestion or runny nose, migraines, irritable bowel) he or she will still need to see a health care provider to be diagnosed and tested when symptoms first present. We can then accept a health care provider's note stating that the student has a chronic condition, and that specific listed symptoms can be expected due to the condition. The note should include a management plan if the symptoms reoccur.

The SCSD Reopening Plan, in its entirety, is posted on the SCSD website. Our plan incorporates recommendations and guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), New York State Department of Health (NYDOH) and the New York State Education Department (NYSED).
