It's hard to believe that we just finished our first month of school. I hope you and your family are healthy and that things are going well. I realize that it has been an adjustment being back in-person especially with all the protocols and the fluidity of the situation. While it's not always easy, we need to continue to be prepared to act, adjust, and respond, depending on COVID-19 community data, our own learning and changing needs, as well as the advice and guidelines provided by medical professionals, including our local department of health.

#### Winter and Spring Student-Athletes Must Be Vaccinated to Participate

At the board of education meeting on October 6, the board approved the requirement for athletes to be vaccinated for participation in upcoming winter and spring sports. Vaccinations (both doses) must be completed by November 14. (This does not apply to fall sports which are already underway.)



This was a difficult decision and came after much discussion, some debate, input from student-athletes and families and information from Keith Brown, the interim public health director for Schenectady County. Dr. Carlos Cotto, assistant superintendent of innovation, equity and engagement, presented an overview of the feedback he and Ms. Miranda, the director of athletics, received. As we explained at the board meeting and Mr. Brown reiterated, when an unvaccinated student is exposed to a person with COVID, he or she is at higher risk and is required to quarantine for 10 days. There is no exception. There is no testing alternative or other means to avoid quarantine. That means, not only do the unvaccinated student-athletes have to sit out of multiple practices and games each time they are exposed, but they are also unable to attend school for the entire period. Unvaccinated players on our JV football team have been quarantined three times, each in response to a single positive COVID case. There are currently 19 players who are under quarantine. The players on the team who are vaccinated are not required to quarantine unless they exhibit symptoms.

Deciding to get the vaccination is a personal and family decision. Mr. Brown spoke about some of the reasons why families opt not to have their 12 and older children vaccinated and urged everyone to get the facts by asking questions and learning about the vaccination. He suggested talking to your doctor or a public health professional instead of getting information from social media. Mr. Brown also noted that accessibility to the vaccine is sometimes an issue.

We, along with our partners at the department of health, are going to help with both. We will be holding an information session where parents and students can learn about the vaccine and ask any questions. We will also be scheduling vaccination clinics for our student-athletes, who decide and get parental permission to receive the vaccination. There is a tight deadline so we will be holding these events very soon.

Again, any student who will be participating in winter or spring sports must be fully vaccinated (both doses completed) by November 14, 2021. There are two approved vaccinations for those 12 and older. If we look at the timeline and required wait time between doses, it means athletes must have:

- If getting the Moderna Vaccine: At least one dose by October 17
- If gettering the Pfizer Vaccine: At least one dose by October 24
- Moderna or Pfizer: The second dose by November 14

Your child's coach will be discussing the vaccine requirement and upcoming events. We are currently working with the Schenectady Department of Health to schedule the information session and clinics. We will share that information as soon as possible.

**Schenectady High School.** This week we put some things in place at Schenectady High School to help support students and staff. We recognize the transition back to school has been difficult for some and that there is a need for additional support and to expedite work to improve

attendance, reinforce norms and boost morale following the challenging past year and a half.

# IS YOUR CHILD MISSING IMMUNIZATIONS? Children will not be able attend school effective October 12.


As per NYS Public Health Law, if your child is missing any required immunizations, effective October 12, they will not be allowed to attend school until required proof of immunization is provided.
