Today I am kicking off my brief with some exciting news. When I arrived in the district last July, I promised to listen, look, and learn. It was important to learn about what is working well and where we should focus efforts for growth and improvement. What became evident during this process is that we need to take a closer look at our high school experience and explore how we can improve it by offering course, college, and career pathways of interest for our students. We are going to begin this work by launching a process for a secondary school redesign.

School redesign is no simple matter. It's about rethinking school ... how it is and how it should be so that our students are inspired, empowered, engaged, motivated and so that we are ensuring that they have the best opportunities to be successful.

Re-designing our high school is important work. It is not only an opportunity for us to innovate but it's also a time for us to rethink and explore the school experience with a fresh approach, relevance, and new pathways to success as part of a future-oriented framework. Our initial redesign focus will begin at the high school with a plan to eventually expand to middle school to provide a seamless secondary experience. Part of this will also be mirrored in the eventual introduction and rollout of the district-wide core instructional program.

The secondary redesign efforts will be led by Lynne Rutnik, deputy superintendent and Tyrone O'Mealley, executive principal of secondary schools. They will be working closely with the high school administrative team, school staff, students, and the school community.

The development of our plan will be done inclusively and collaboratively. We will be seeking input from all stakeholders including students, staff, parents, and community members. Engagement sessions with students and staff are scheduled for January 31 and February 1. Parents and community members will be invited to attend virtual sessions on February 2 and 3 respectively. Both sessions will be held at 5 p.m. The links to attend will be shared next week and posted on our website. There will also be a "Stop-In-Session" for anyone who wants to drop in and share thoughts and ideas as well as an opportunity to participate in a survey. As always, you can always share your thoughts and ideas through Let's Talk. We hope to have great participation from all stakeholder groups. The process will be transparent. The input and feedback that we collect, as well as next steps, will be shared. Please watch for updates.

Earlier this week, we were honored to have Randi Weingarten, President of the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) who represents 1.7 million members, visiting our schools, and talking with our teachers. Thank you to Juliet Benaquisto, President of the Schenectady Federation of Teachers (SFT), for arranging Ms. Weingarten's visit. Ms. Weingarten spoke highly of our district and Schenectady educators. Thank you to MVP Healthcare for hosting our elementary and secondary principals' meetings on Wednesday. The MVP facility, located in downtown Schenectady, is beautiful. 
