Dear Schenectady Community,

Happy Friday! It was another exciting week in our district. On Tuesday, we brought our Schenectady High School Seniors together in the auditorium to make the surprise announcement that every one of them had been granted early instant admission to SUNY Schenectady in the fall. Approximately 400 students were presented with acceptance letters and next steps so they can begin planning for college entry.

This commitment between our district and SUNY Schenectady, called the "Schenectady Promise," ensures that every one of our graduating seniors have access and the opportunity to attend college including those who, prior to this, may not have considered college as an option. Removing the barrier of access supports our work around equity. As of this day, the question asked by many of our high school senior changed from, "can I get into college," to "what do I want to study in college?"

The students cheered, clapped and were clearly excited when the announcement was made. It was a proud day for all of us.

We are extremely grateful to Dr. Steady Moono, President of SUNY Schenectady, and his team at the college, for their continued partnership in education and for this incredible pathway and opportunity that was made available to our students. Please take a couple minutes and watch the video of the announcement.

Thank you also to Mayor McCarthy, Board President Cathy Lewis and board members, Schenectady City Council members, and Schenectady High School leadership, faculty and staff who were on hand for the announcement and celebration. We are all in this work together. Together, we are making a difference. #schenectadyrising

Speaking of equity, access and opportunity, this week I was honored to present at the New York State Council of School Superintendents (NYSCOSS) Winter Conference on our work with SchenEQUITY. I spoke about our focus on student programming and system change to increase access, opportunity, and quality of education for our students.

Please spread the word that <u>kindergarten registration</u> is now open. Parents do not need to make an appointment to register. They can simply walk-in to the central registration office located at 108 Education Drive. For planning purposes, including staffing and class sectioning, room planning and more, it is important that families register as soon as possible. We offer many opportunities and supports for our kindergarteners and their families. See page six for more.

Pre-K registration will open on April 14. While we would like to begin the application process now, we must wait until the locations are set and approved. Pre-K is full-day programming that is designed to ensure that our youngest learners master important skills, have opportunities to interact and engage with peers, and are prepared to enter kindergarten in our district. We will continue to provide reminders as we get closer to accepting applications.




