Good afternoon and TGIF,

I hope you are doing well and had a great week. It's been another busy one so I'm sure you are looking forward to the weekend. If you've been counting down the days to spring recess, we are almost there. Less than a week to go.

I'll start my brief by saying congratulations to Steve Balogh, a social studies teacher at Mont Pleasant Middle School, who was <u>featured as WNYT's Top Teacher</u> last week. Only one teacher from the entire region is selected by WNYT for this honor each week. The teacher is nominated and recognized because they go above and beyond, have a positive impact on students and community and make a difference. This is a fantastic honor, and we are proud of Mr. Balogh for being nominated an selected. Please join me in congratulating him.

Mr. Gillooley presented a second draft 2022-2023 Budget Proposal to the Board of Education this week. While the proposal includes everything that was outlined in the initial proposal, the proposed spending plan is decreased by \$3.8 million. This is because some of the outlined positions will be paid out the federal CRRSA and ARP grant funding. Therefore, the cost of these positions will not be included in the general fund and part of the spending plan. The board will consider the adoption of a \$239,167,067 spending plan at next Wednesday's board meeting. The tax levy remains flat.

Overall, the budget proposal serves to increase student support services (counselors, social workers, safety personnel, restorative practice specialists), athletic and extracurricular opportunities (modified sports at the middle school level), and ensures every school has a library media specialist and parent liaisons. The proposal also supports extended learning time at school, development of our community school initiative, improvements to our facilities, implementation of a secondary school redesign (creating pathways and opportunities for students), new literacy curriculum, increased professional learning opportunities and partnership with community-based organizations.

Mr. Gillooley also recommended that a proposition, to create a Capital Reserve Fund, be considered. The purpose would be to establish an account specifically for funding general building improvements, construction, renovations, or additions as needed at our schools. Our buildings are currently being assessed for short and long-term needs (otherwise known as a building-condition survey). At the end of the year, unused funds would be put into the Capital Reserve Account, which would be used to pay for the cost of work that needs to be done. If the board approves including the proposition, it will be included on the ballot, and considered by voters on May 17.


This week the board also approved a resolution regarding vaccine requirements for sports participation. With this resolution, only athletes who participate in high-risk sports are required to be vaccinated for COVID-19. Prior to this all athletes were required to be vaccinated to participate. This change is in accordance with the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH). The change goes into effect immediately.

A couple weeks ago, our Secondary School Redesign Committee presented an update to the board of education. The team reported that they are exploring and reviewing opportunities for the secondary school experience. Since our current 8th graders will be entering high school next year, we feel it is important to hear what they think, are excited about and are concerned about. Ms. Rutnik and Mr. O'Mealley met with 8th graders at all three middle schools this week to talk about our efforts to enhance their high school experiences, to hear from them, and to collect and consider their thoughts and ideas. The 8th graders have also been asked to provide feedback on a survey. While the conversations will continue, I want to be clear that no decisions have been made. We are still meeting with students, parents and staff and continue to explore the various possibilities. We will be holding a community town hall to share more information and hear your thoughts. We will let you know when that will be scheduled. We understand that discussing change is difficult but at the end of the day our goal is to improve outcomes for all students.

New York State Regents Exams will be administered in June and August. As per regulations of the commissioner of education, students must earn passing scores on English, math, science, and social studies exams in order to earn a high school diploma.
